

ALASKA BASELINE EROSION ASSESSMENT

Erosion Information Paper – Northway Village, Alaska

Current as of March 3, 2008

Community Information

Northway Village, population 87, is at the end of Northway Road between the Nabesna River and Skate Lake, approximately 2 miles past the Northway Airport, and 42 miles from the Canadian border. The village is in the Tetlin National Wildlife Refuge. Northway Village is unincorporated in the unorganized borough.

Description of Erosion Problem

The Nabesna River is a moderately flowing, shallow, braided glacial river that increases in volume when heavy spring and summer rains combine with snow melt. The Northway Airport runway and land surrounding the Northway Village was flooded in the late 1940's and one end of the runway has been flooded occasionally in more recent years. The Nebesna River is eroding at approximately Mile 2.5 to 2.6 of Northway Road where the road crosses Fish Creek.

Potential Damages

The Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT/PF) re-routed Mark Creek between 1994 and 1996 when they created a new flow channel into Fish Creek. The re-routed creek has eroded into 2 lakes, adding silt, adding mud, and contributing to downstream flooding and erosion. The re-routed Mark Creek flow into Fish Creek is currently placing homes at risk between Mile 2.5 to 2.6 along Northway Road. Erosion primarily impacts homes on Fish Creek, but may move downstream and impact Northway Village. A portion of the Northway Road near the village was armored by DOT/PF to protect the road. This protection measure seems to be effectively controlling erosion near the village. An erosion project was initially funded through the Corps in 2001, however funds were later withdrawn. The community has continued to apply for assistance through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Northway Village is concerned they may be adversely affected in the future as the erosion moves downstream.
